# WHAT WAS THE MOST SURPRISING PART OF RELAUNCHING FOR YOU?

Honestly, how easy it really was. I say that in retrospect but one reason why it was easy was the fact that I took time. I took baby steps, even a place holder job. While transitioning from the restaurant job followed by the break and the master's degree, I took up a physically demanding job at Costco. I worked almost full-time then [close to 30- 35 hours a week], even though it was classified as a part-time job. Taking that job, outside my comfort zone, got me in that mindset of thinking professionally and having a more rigid schedule.

But it was hard! It was physically demanding, because I had to stand for 6 or 8 hours selling products. It used a different skillset, made me talk to people. In some ways, it gave me the confidence because I had to meet daily sales goals. A small bonus was based off of it and achieving that gave me the much needed validation.
